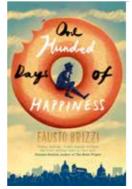

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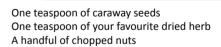

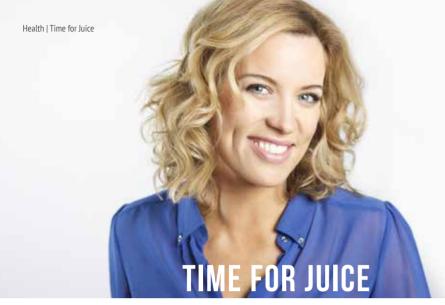


WHAT YOU DO

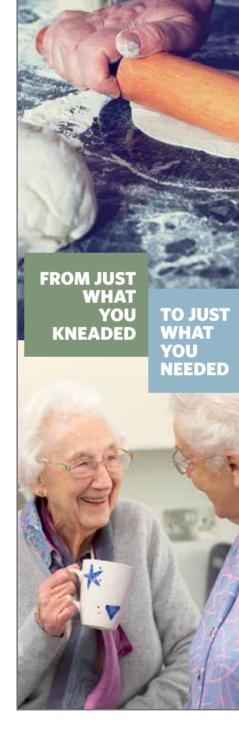

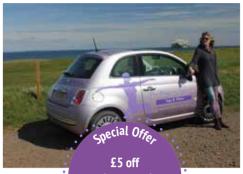
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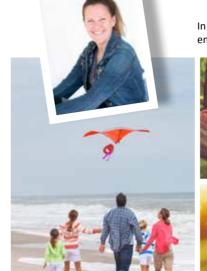
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In this issue **Bernie Petrie** tells us the end of summer is the perfect time to embrace new things and rediscover forgotten parts of ourselves.

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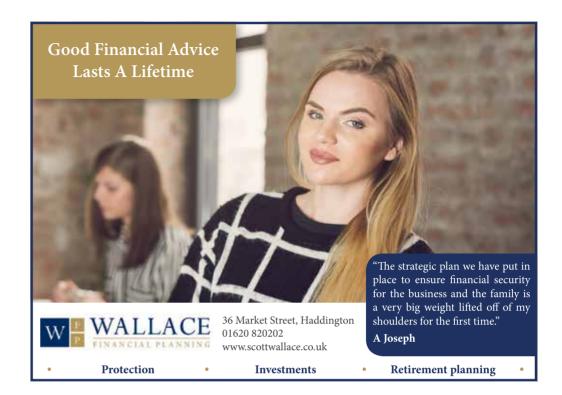
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ART SALE IN AID OF EAST LOTHIAN YOUNG CARERS

Three local artists are holding an art sale to support local charity – East Lothian Young Carers

Wendy Portway, Pam McKenzie and Julie Otter are holding an art sale of paintings, cards, prints and creative work in St Andrew Blackadder Church on Friday 11 and Saturday 12 August with a third of proceeds going to East Lothian Young Carers.

East Lothian Young Carers (ELYC) support young people between the ages of 5 to 24 and their families. Young Carers are ordinary young people who look after family members who are ill or disabled. Consequently, they often miss out on their own childhood and can have difficulty coping at school.

ELYC organise activities and support groups, giving youngsters the opportunity to mix with others who understand their concerns and giving them a chance to have time for themselves and develop social skills and gain in confidence. Julie explains "To ensure that support is accessible to all, ELYC provides free accompanied transport to and from activities. The cost of this alone is £30,000 a year. Like all charities we struggle financially to cover our costs and hope this art sale will provide some help to those who need it most."

ost people remember all too well their first attempts at riding a bike; being lovingly helped along by mum or dad, the thrill of moving faster than you ever have on two wheels, and that feeling of accomplishment once you realise there's no longer an adult's hand on your back helping you balance.

The thrill of riding a bike continues for some well into adulthood, but many of us ditch the bike in favour of a car as soon as we're able to drive. For Richard Dowsett, the thrill has not waned. An avid cyclist, Richard set up Leith Cycle Co ten years ago and his newest venture — The Bike Hub — combines his passion for cycling and his love of East Lothian. Based at Archerfield Walled Garden, The Bike Hub opened its doors on 16 June this year and aims to be a one-stop shop for cyclists and the hub of biking in East Lothian. Richard said "We are creating a destination cycling location in East Lothian that will house everything cyclists need. It's not only a shop, but a place where people can meet, get engaged and get active."

There are so many reasons to get back on a bike especially over the summer months but, not everyone can be bothered with the hassle of loading a bike into the car to then drive miles to find the perfect cycling location. The Bike Hub makes it as easy as, well, riding a bike! Located on the beautiful Archerfield Estate, there is a huge variety of cycle routes including the John Muir Way, coastal paths, and roads through East Lothian which take in beautiful viewpoints, visitor attractions, historic sites and seaside villages. There is also an extensive network of traffic-free and relatively flat routes ideal for the whole family. For those seeking a bit more of a thrill, fat bikers can take advantage of the coast and wooded areas.

If having spent a day cycling round the beautiful East Lothian countryside you've been well and truly bitten by the cycling bug then you can purchase your own bike from The Bike Hub plus – -they offer servicing and repairs. You can join Richard for their regular Thursday evening ride outs, which are suitable for all abilities. With plans to host maintenance classes, kids' bike clubs and more 'Ride With Me' cycles, there really is no reason not to visit the Bike Hub and get back on your bike.

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DOLPHINS AND CRABS TAKE OVER THE SEABIRD CENTRE!

This August at the Scottish Seabird Centre, North Berwick, the dolphins and crabs take centre stage with an interactive science show and puppet performance for families.

What's for Snack? (ideal for age 2+) is an interactive puppet show with Seabird team member, Craig the Crab. With sing-a-long fun, young visitors will be asked to help Craig who has eaten some marine litter by mistake. He will be joined by some of his seaside friends who will aim to help him get rid of his sore tummy.

Older kids are invited to attend Ocean-a-rific (recommended for age 6+) with Dr Dolph Lingerinaboot. With scientific experiments, games and gaffes, visitors are invited to help dolphins understand what is happening to the seas around Scotland.

Malcolm Watson, Seabird Science Communicator, said: "Dolphins and crabs are always hugely popular with visitors young and old alike. As we make our move towards a wider marine-based Centre, we are keen that people appreciate the variety of amazing marine wildlife, including seabirds.

"With Craig the Crab and Dr Dolph Lingerin-aboot there will be lots of music, fun and games, ideal for keeping the family entertained, whatever the weather this August."

In addition to the daily events, there will be a range of family-friendly activities in the Discovery Centre including special trails for dolphins and puffins, expert mini talks on a range of seabirds, as well as the Kids' Zone and Kids' Corner.

For practical tips on house-based horticulture, to how to perfect your #shelfie with inspirational photographs and genius care tips for your inside garden. There are a whole host of reads to help you up your 'greenteriors' game. Plus, they look great styled on your coffee table even if that's as far as you get!

#2 START!

Don't obsess, don't aim for perfection, don't wait until you get the proper tools. Get some dirt under your fingernails and get creative with your planting projects. Dress up your plants DIY style, reusing and recycling. My current favourite is re-purposing colourful glass candles as plant pots or vases.

#3 TRY SIMPLE

Find a dead space in your home, such as hallways, landings and corridors. Bring it to life with a slimline trough planter, its depth easily disguises ugly plastic pots. Populate with any plants you come across on your next trip to the garden centre or (whispered) IKEA. Mix up the textures with delicate wispy ferns and long spiky fronds.

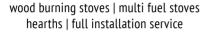


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Nothing says summer quite like lavender - row upon row of stunning colour with its scent wafting on the warm breeze. A collaboration between a local lavender farm and home-wares producer will have you bringing lavender into your home, evoking the sunny, carefree ease of Provence - even when the Scottish weather is letting us down.

Swathes of lavender fields under azure Provençal skies evoke memories of carefree summer holidays. In fact, it's hard to imagine a plant which is more evocative of summer than lavender, especially with its intense colour and incredible scent.

But it's not only Provence where row upon row of fragrant lavender grows in abundance. Just outside Gifford, nestled at the foot of the Lammermuir Hills. is Lothian Lavender - currently the only lavender grower in Scotland. Known as the 'Garden of Scotland', East Lothian has proven itself to be well suited to growing lavender. Sue and Grant Tait, throughout 2016 and into 2017 planted approximately 1.000 lavender plants in a small

paddock on the family farm. And this year will see the first harvest.

Their small retail shop stocks original hand-made products by Sue, using dried lavender from the farm. This summer they will also be stocking a candle produced in collaboration with Gullane-based Laura Thomas Linens, along with other LT products.

Laura says "There was a Scottish Lavender farm up in Aberdeen until the 80s before the land got sold for development, so exciting times for Scotland to be gaining another. Lothian Lavender is currently the only Scottish producer of lavender grown intended for commercial purposes and it's exciting to be a part of it!"

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NORTH BERWICK'S BLOOMING BEAUTIFUL

North Berwick looks like the archetypal chocolate-box town - its high street festooned with colourful hanging baskets and the harbour's quirky flower-filled boats and tubs. It's all thanks to a team of dedicated green-fingered volunteers who give up their time all year round, in all weathers to ensure the town is always in full bloom.







N orth Berwick in Bloom has come a long way from the 1990s when the town, rather in the doldrums and needing a boost, set about improving planting and horticultural initiatives in order to encourage local businesses and attract visitors. These efforts proved successful and both visitors and residents welcomed these enhancements to the town's natural beauty.

Since then, In Bloom has developed into an active team of volunteers, helping to improve the town and also achieving many competition successes, including being nine times gold medal winners of the Beautiful Scotland Coastal category. And in 2016, for the third time, they won the Rosebowl for the highest score across all categories in Beautiful Scotland. The team has represented Scotland on a couple of occasions, winning three Gold medals. This year they are, once again, the Scottish representative in the 'Coastal Category with Populations up to 12,000' facing competition from Whitby, Hunstanton, Newcastle (Northern Ireland), Sidmouth and Silloth on Solway. The results will be known at the end of October.

However, competition is not the driving force of In Bloom, led by Rosie Oberlander and supported by a small committee. The team works all year round with East Lothian Council, schools, local businesses and other groups such as Rotary to ensure that the positive, high profile of the town can be maintained. This is, of course, helped by winning accolades from prestigious national horticultural organisations.

The In Bloom year starts in September, planning the programme of planting and maintenance for the year ahead. Volunteers meet every Monday morning to ensure the main streets, the Lodge grounds, the beach and harbour areas continue to look their best. With increased awareness of environmental issues, every attempt is made to introduce sustainable planting and use plants suitable to the maritime climate in the 120 tubs, barrels, boats, carts and trains around the town. Not to mention the 95 hanging baskets on the high street which create a summer wow-factor. The team also plants containers of vegetables and a new community orchard is developing steadily.

Rosie is proud of the volunteers who are very flexible and always happy to welcome new people. There is also strong community involvement and fundraising initiatives prove popular. These include the annual Tulip Festival's afternoon tea, a Christmas tea and volunteer Sheila Sinclair's guizzes. "We are grateful for the interest and support shown by residents and visitors. We are a happy bunch, love what we do and are always open to new ideas and to work with others in improving the quality of the environment".
