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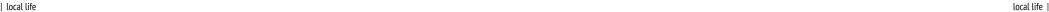

nthropom is the creation of Etta, a mother of H two young girls, who lives outside Haddington. Anthropom sells personalised three-dimensional pompom pictures on quality cotton fabric, framed in wooden embroidery hoops. Hand made by Etta at home, whilst running around after her children (and three legged dog!), they make lovely gifts for new babies, children's birthdays and unique presents to mark special occasions. They also make a cute alternative to a traditional door plague and displayed as a group either on a wall or propped on a shelf, they will create an original focal point in any room.

Etta started making her Anthropoms for friends, but as the word spread and demand grew, an online shop was set up on Etsy. She explains "I started making my Anthropoms as presents for friends as I wanted to give them something a bit more original than the usual gifts from the high street. Everything I make is handmade which means that no two items are identical. A lot of time and effort goes into each of my pieces and I love seeing them in situ on a nursery or bedroom wall"

Taking inspiration from nature, the majority of Etta's creations are anthropomorphic versions of wildlife, although the latest range of Anthropom birds are more realistic in their look. Etta adds "I don't just make animals, there are people too. As I create, ideas pop into my head, so the collection evolves!" Etta also takes commissions and each Anthropom can be personalised.

Ancient mythology suggested that Anthropomorphic deities exhibited human qualities such as beauty, wisdom and power. So, perhaps this is the driving force behind Etta's original and bold charitable act to raise money for Womankind Worldwide. In March this year, Etta shaved off all of her hair to raise money for the charity and donated her hair to the Little Princesses Trust, who create wigs for children who have lost their hair through illness and disease. Not only that, but she is also using Anthropom to help raise further funds for the charity. For any Anthropom orders placed by Local Life readers before the end of April Etta will donate 25% of the proceeds to Womankind Worldwide.

Speaking of the reasons behind her unique choice of fundraising activity Etta said "As a mother of two daughters, the charity Womankind Worldwide is close to my heart. It is a global women's rights organisation that works to transform the lives of women and girls in male-dominated societies that suppress and control women of all ages, from all countries and backgrounds. I want to set an example to my daughters to feel confident in themselves and grow up in a society where both men and women are equal without having to auestion it."

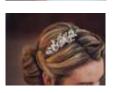


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Mind, Body and Soul Columnist, Bernie Petrie asks us to open our hearts, this spring and let more love in.

We need to use our hearts in everything we do. My early memories from when I was four or five years old tell me that I experienced praise and pain simultaneously, so I put up barriers becoming self-critical and self-conscious particularly in my early passions – art, dancing and singing. I was to scared to fully express myself because in the moment of praise from teachers came sneers from others. By believing that getting praise would also cause people not to like me, I put barriers around my heart, particularly when doing things that I loved, as it hurt too much.

What I didn't understand then, is that the neural pathways in our brain are forged in pairs — in my case praise accompanied pain*. Ever wonder why you associate one thing with another, like chocolate and joy? All early childhood experiences forge neural pathways that pop up together again and again.

Thankfully we can teach ourselves to recognise a limiting pathway and learn to side-step the auto response. We can stop letting the fear of rejection or jealously from allowing us to create the things that cause us joy. Ask yourself – in what area of my life do I need to open my heart more to let more love in? What is it that you would really love to do? Like the flowers emerging from the snow covered ground in spring, it's time to take that leap of faith and open your heart.

These days, when mass-produced furniture goes for a song from stores like lkea, it's refreshing to see a wave of artisan furniture-makers bravely going against the grain.

Joshua Miller, is one of the new wave of artisan furniture makers breathing new life into the old-fashioned carpentry trade. Using his natural designing ability and his woodworking skills he founded his company, Aspect 6, after graduating from the renowned East Lothian-based Chippendale International School of Furniture in 2008. Equipped with skills in traditional and modern furniture making, Josh specialises in both cabinetmaking and antique restoration.

A talented young furniture designer, Josh produces bespoke top quality woodwork for both domestic and commercial use from his East Lothian workshop which he shares with workshop dog, Crux (pictured above left). His impressive customer list includes Benugo at RBS headquarters and Archerfield Walled Garden, where all the exquisite bar, woodwork and coffee tables are Josh's work. "Making great furniture is not only about creating something that looks good and works well, it's about giving it character and personality – a tangible link to its owner." Josh explains "We work alongside our customers throughout the entire process to make them feel part of the piece so they can share its story."

A key part of the business is restoration and Aspect 6 restores a broad range of furniture from 18th and 19th Century antiques, through to 1950s vintage furniture. 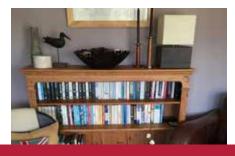

As the evenings grow lighter and we peel off the layers, I don't know about you, but my focus turns to lighter healthier food, which lifts our spirits and in turn makes us feel good and more energetic. Cut to this month's recipe - a healthy and vegan lasagne! Yes, healthy and vegan with my no-dairy cheese sauce. Really, you can hardly tell the difference. It takes a bit of preparation but it's well worth the effort.

YOUR TOMATO SAUCE

2 tins of 400gr chopped tomatoes 2 cloves of garlic 2 medium onions

Black pepper and sea salt to taste Really good tomato purée Splash of red wine if you have a bottle open! Touch of Maple Syrup

Pop everything in a slow cooker if you have one, or simmer over a low heat for 4 hours. I cook my sauce over two days, switching it off when I go to bed. Make a big batch, and you can freeze half of it for next time.

YOUR NO-DAIRY CHEESE SAUCE

3 oz spelt flour 2 heaped tablespoons of Engevita Vegan Yeast Flakes (available from earth matters) 1 pint Oatly oat milk

2 desertspoons of Apple Cider Vinegar Olive Oil 1/2 teaspoon Cayenne pepper Salt and pepper to taste

Tablespoon of olive oil

Make a roux using the flour and enough olive oil to form a paste. Add the oat milk a little at a time until you have a thick sauce. Add the flakes, cayenne pepper and apple cider vinegar. Season and keep tasting until it's a cheese sauce.

THEN...

For your filling use whatever roasted vegetables you fancy. Put all your veg in a roasting tin and cook until soft. To make the lasagne, layer with spinach, kale, basil, the sauces and lasagne. I use Spelt Lasagne Bion which I think is the best, (you can buy this from Earth Matters). Cook in oven for about 50 minutes on 160/170°C fan assisted.

Wild Dining with the Mad March Hare is more than just eating outside, it's innovative and contemporary dining at its best. Created by Amanda Farnese-Heath, the Wild Dining experience was inspired by Amanda's passion for bringing people together, to eat, at a long table, in beautiful places.

Food has always been a mainstay in Amanda's life, brought up in an Italian household, everything happened around the kitchen table. A culmination of years in a busy kitchen led to the Mad March Hare pop-ups. The idea was to find redundant kitchens and set up camp for as long as they were allowed. Amanda explains "Mad March Hare was conceived in a pub kitchen, we had no name and no idea how many folk were going to turn up to as we did not take bookings. It was the maddest opening evening you could imagine and was completely heaving, myself and the guys in the kitchen just managed to pull it off! Hence the 'mad', the rest; in the Chinese horoscope I am a Hare and I was born in March. Mad March Hare was born!"

Mad March Hare organises magical foodie events reminiscent of Amanda's childhood days. They focus on small specialist food and drink launches and long table dinners which are mainly outdoors in secret, beautiful, unusual and remote locations, where you share big plates of rustic, delicious food. Amanda says "When I started popping up in kitchens with bad lighting, (strip lighting really effects my mood), I loved the idea of what I was doing but it never felt like it was completely me. It took time to realise that somewhere in my Italian make up, was the joy of being outdoors, in a warm climate at a long table set out in an olive grove, enjoying a rustic feast with friends. But I live in Scotland and it's cold, yet I thought, why not? Let's give it a go."

The first Wild Dining event launched last October, with a seven-course meal served over four hours in a chilly, yet beautiful, autumnal forest. Amanda adds "The ground covered in pine needles was soft and smelt divine, the tall trees protected us from the westerly wind and even the candles stayed alight. There was no kitchen or walls to restrict me and the whole evening felt like a dream."

Each menu is planned around the seasons, the location and the tastiest ingredients Amanda can find. There is always something extra to make each event magical and memorable; be it a forage along the seashore, screening an outdoor movie, or a classical ensemble. Amanda explains "If there's a forage beforehand, for say, seaweed, we will make sure one of the dishes includes that ingredient. Although, I'm mindful that not everybody will enjoy a whole menu of seaweed because it might be a first taste for some people."

The food is not fussy, it's simple, delicious and tasty. It is mainly cooked over fire to enhance flavour and is served slowly throughout the evening so guests can enjoy each course and the magical experience. And it really is magical - long tables beautifully decorated, stunning locations - Scotland and Wild Dining works, you just need to wrap up warm. Although Amanda can help with that as well "For our first event, I made some cashmere pockets from an old jumper with hand warmers inside if anybody needed them!"

Delicious finger-licking street food, signature ales, seasonal cocktails, music and a family-friendly carnival atmosphere – it's all part of the revolution!

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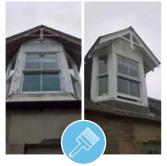
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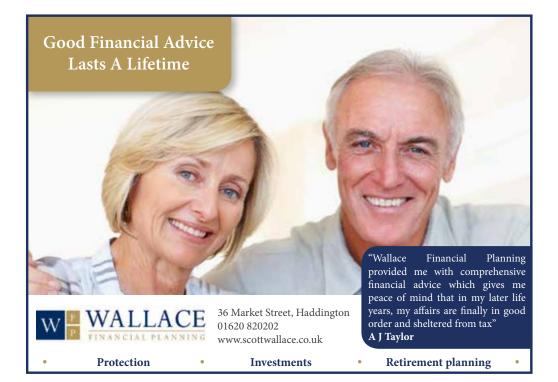

TURNING THE TIDE ON PLASTICS

As a conservation and education charity, human impact on the environment and wildlife is at the forefront of the work of the team at North Berwick's Scottish Seabird Centre. They are working hard to raise awareness of some extremely important environmental issues.

mall changes can have a significant impact and the Seabird team supports reducing plastic waste wherever possible and practices this throughout the Centre. In the Seabird Café there are compostable straws, recyclable glass bottles and jars, and sauce sachets are being replaced by dispensers and compostable containers. The Centre also offers a 50p discount on hot drinks, when customers bring their own cup.

In the Discovery Centre, there are seasonal and family-friendly interactive science shows which bring environmental issues to life in an accessible and fun way to highlight how we can all help to make a difference. Professor Egghead, who appears in many different guises each year, engages young and old in a bid to instil behavioural change.

This approach is supported by Education Officer, Andrew Grieveson, who offers a range of environmental-based workshops for primary and secondary school pupils, encouraging people to change their buying habits linked to plastics and non-recyclable items. The Seabird Centre works in partnership with North Berwick in Bloom, East place.

Education Officer, Andrew said: "For our community beach cleans, in the region of 80-100 people attend and we normally collect around 40 bags of rubbish. At these, and the annual Marine Conservation Great British Beach Clean Survey which we also support, plastic is by far the biggest offender. We find things such as food packaging, plastic cutlery, microplastics and lots of cotton bud sticks, which all have an impact, not only on the landscape, but also on wildlife.

"Changing behaviour is crucial. The more people understand about the impact of plastics on the natural environment and what they can do to help, the better. We all need to reduce, reuse and recycle more to help our amazing wildlife."
