



ROSEMARY





Ayurvedic Yoga for Winter Wellness



veryone experiences winter differently - some people relish winter whilst others dread it, and Ayurveda has the answers. By understanding your unique constitution and applying simple changes, winter doesn't have 🕳 to be a drudge. Winter is known as Kapha season with strong Vata undertones, and you're more likely to feel heavy, sluggish, cold and dry. Now is the time to eat healthy, warm, cooked, oily (ghee) and spicy foods with plenty of seasonal vegetables; for most of us, 60% liquid foods like soups, curries and dals and 40% solid foods. Drink plenty of hot water/herbal teas and keep moving, getting plenty of fresh air, connecting to sunlight and cultivating a daily yoga practice. This way, you will nourish yourself from the inside out by keeping yourself supple, strong, and free from stagnant energy. If you have the time after yoga, apply some hot Mahanaryan oil to your body or any aching joints. Here are two yoga poses that will help you this winter.



Not everyone can do an hour of yoga every day, so simple exercises to warm the spine and joints and a few sets of Sun Salutations or Moon Salutations are sufficient. If you incorporate pranayama and relaxation at the end of your practice, you will be doing well. Start with some deep breathing exercises (pranayama) whilst lying on your back and ensuring you are warm and comfortable. Take a deep breath in through the nose, hold for three counts and exhale through the nose, continue for five rounds. After Supine Twist, come to Child's pose and then move into Table Top pose. Inhale, lift your head up, tilt your pelvis and look up for cat; exhale, round your spine, tucking your chin into your chest for cow. Continue connecting your breath with your movements for five rounds. This versatile flowing movement warms the spine, increasing the range of flexibility and motion; it stretches, strengthens and lengthens the body whilst increasing awareness and focus. It is stimulating and relaxing and helps open/expand the chest/lungs, keeping the heart active.

Also known as Balancing Table Pose you can practice this pose after Cat Cow. Stay in Table Top Pose, inhale, engage your core, lift your right arm and left leg, gazing down or forward, exhale and come back to Table Top Pose. Inhale, lift your left arm and right leg, exhale and come back to Table Top Pose. Continue for five rounds, remembering to breathe. As a variation, you can rotate your wrists and ankles in an anti-clockwise and then clockwise direction whilst holding the arms and legs up; this way, you are releasing any trapped energy in the joints at the same time. You can also bring your knee to your nose for a more dynamic flow. Keep your shoulders and hips in line, and if you need to, put a blanket underneath your knees for comfort. After five rounds come to Down Ward Facing Dog and practice six rounds of Sun Salutations. This pose stretches, strengthens and lengthens the body whilst increasing focus and concentration. It is great for our core strength and increases our digestive fire (Agni). It maintains our spinal health and thus has a positive effect on our nervous system and our mental health. It is also energising and relaxing.



ello, dear reader; it feels good to be writing this column again, after three years of extracts from my book, *Permission to Shine*. Thank you to the editor for selecting chapters for publication, allowing me to show up in the magazine with no effort on my part. I took a break from writing after being diagnosed with breast cancer in 2020, which led to early menopause. A year later, my whole world fell apart. The road to recovery was long, and just when I thought I was starting to see the light, I was diagnosed with cancer a second time. I have stage 4 lung and liver cancer, and this has brought a sharp focus to all that is important in my life – writing being one of them.

Cancer has been mentally, physically and spiritually challenging – yet it has also been full of love and blessings, which take my breath away. Throughout, I've realised how important my circles of light have become. I'm blessed to be surrounded by them – in terms of immediate family and close female friends.

As women age, our close female friend groups are one of the most important aspects of our happiness and longevity. This is not to negate male friendships, but as women, there is something very important about the kind of women we surround ourselves with. (If you are a man reading this, your male circles of light are equally important!) I've had to learn to ask for help in ways I couldn't have imagined as I navigate this chapter in my life, and it's been incredibly humbling, rewarding and frightening at the same time.

Female friendship is something many of us struggle with, possibly due to early childhood experiences. It didn't come naturally to me as the first four years of my life were dominated by close sibling relationships. I didn't have to go elsewhere for companionship, so the challenge of making friends became real when I started school. I've talked with many friends over the past few months about friendships and have been astounded by how many struggled with this in their early years.

The common thread is we don't believe we are enough to be someone's real friend. This is a toxic and untrue thought, and it is one we need to shake off as we move into the later stages of life, as it's never too late to surround yourself with meaningful friends. One of the many things I love about my friends is they have different personalities and can provide me with the different things I need from friendship. Some make me laugh out loud; some help me be more adventurous, while others bring out my compassionate side. All of these friendships are vital for our health and well-being.



So, what could your circles of light look like? Think about the women in your life. Some friends from childhood will still be with you, others have been left in the past. Perhaps there is a friendship to be rekindled and enhanced - Christmas is a perfect time to reconnect with them. Other circles of light could be a swimming group, sewing group, a book club, an art club or a volunteering group. Finding meaningful friendships by sharing a passion can only be positive. I meet with a small group of women every morning at 8 am to go for a sea swim, and this circle of light singlehandedly keeps me grounded and present in a way that nothing else does. At the same time, I find myself meditating and imagining all my beautiful female friends and family members from around the world in a circle together. This is a very powerful visualisation, and I know that love amongst us is very strong.

Living with incurable cancer is not something I contemplated having to do, yet here I am, seven months in, and these circles of light have sustained, fed and nurtured me through it. I'll finish with a short poem I wrote; I hope it helps you find your circles of light. A close friend, Alisoun Mackenzie, has written a book called *Nourishing Friendships: How to Make Friends You Love in Midlife and Beyond*. It may also help – you can find it on Amazon.







s November draws to a close and December makes its entrance, we say goodbye to the vibrant autumn leaves and embrace the longer nights and shorter days of winter. While the thought of dwindling daylight can be daunting, Scotland is full of charm in the colder months. Winter invites us to don our warm coats, snuggle into woolly hats and jumpers, enjoy invigorating walks in the frosty air, and unwind in charming pubs afterwards with a refreshing pint, all while hoping for a sprinkle of lovely, crisp snow.

It also means the festive season is fast approaching. My wife and I love Christmas! When we say we love Christmas, we don't mean the panic in the build-up or the chaos of the shops. We love the coming together of loved ones, family and friends, dining together, and the generally positive vibes and goodwill from everyone. We value the Christmas traditions we grew up with, as well as the new ones we've created together.

Every year, we visit Beanston Farm to pick the perfect Christmas tree. Once it's home, we decorate it to the sounds of a Christmas vinyl, all while savouring mulled wine made, of course, with 'By Julia' Gullane Glögg. I also make sure to visit Helle at Beech and Birch in Gifford to pick up some pressies and a gift (to myself) of the Danish woolly socks she sells – it's an annual gift.

I always visit The Cheese Lady in Haddington to ensure I have the most amazing cheese board for Christmas and place an order with Belhaven Smokehouse for salmon for a festive breakfast and Boxing Day buffet. This year I am going to attempt a Danish-style Christmas dinner of Roast Duck on Christmas Eve for visiting family - who knows perhaps that is a new tradition in the making.

Our favourite tradition, of course, is a traditional Christmas Day lunch complete with all the trimmings. Not to mention the traditional leftovers - they're the best! Sometimes, there is so much; the last thing you want the day after is a second Christmas lunch. But don't worry; here are a couple of recipes to show you just how incredible leftovers can be. Rest assured, no Turkey fricassee in sight!



ubble and squeak is a great way to use leftovers after a Sunday roast, not just Christmas, and it is fantastic for breakfast. Serve with avocado, crispy bacon and a fried, poached or scrambled egg. Feeling adventurous, then serve with Belhaven Smokehouse smoked haddock or hot smoked salmon and a poached egg with a creamy hollandaise sauce.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tbsp goose, duck, beef fat (if used for the Christmas roasties) or butter Christmas left over vegetables; roast potatoes and 2-3 pigs in blankets finely chopped and mashed If you have eaten all the veg then;
- 10 cooked Brussels sprouts and/or cabbage cooked and sliced 1-2 carrots cooked and finely chopped 400g mashed potatoes

MFTHOD

1. Melt 1 tbsp of fat or butter in a non-stick pan, allow it to get nice and hot, then add your chopped pigs in blankets or chopped streaky bacon rashers and brown.

- leftover vegetables and potato in a bowl and mash together.
- 3. Place your vegetable and potato mix in the pan and push it down so that the mixture covers the base of the pan.
- 4. Allow the mixture to catch slightly on the base of the pan before turning it over. It's the bits of potato that catch in the pan that make a true 'bubble and squeak'; let it colour and crisp! Then, turn
- 5. Cut into wedges and serve immediately. If you have leftover bubble and squeak, it can be kept in the fridge for up to two days and rewarmed in the

- melted. Skim off as many of the white solids that rise to the surface of the butter as you
- can, then keep the butter warm (but do not allow it to foam or colour).
- 2. Whisk the egg yolks, vinegar, lemon juice and a pinch of salt together in a heatproof bowl that will fit snugly over a small saucepan. Add a little water to the saucepan and bring it to a bare simmer, then place the bowl on top and whisk the melted butter into the egg mixture bit by bit until it turns pale and thick (about 3-5 minutes). Sometimes white solids will sink to the bottom; do not add this when whisking just the clarified butter. Once smooth and creamy, taste for seasoning and keep warm. Do not overheat, as it will scramble. Hollandaise is served warm, not hot. If not using straight away, cover with cling film to avoid a skin forming and keep warm in a bowl of warm water.

CHRISTMAS LEFTOVER TOASTIE

INGREDIENTS (serves 2)

- 4 slices of sourdough (2 per person) 3 tbsp mayonnaise
- 2 4 slices of cooked turkey Left over gravy
- 2 4 slices of stuffing
- 4 tbsp cranberry sauce
- 2 4 slices Emmental cheese
- (you can use Brie if you prefer from the Christmas cheese board)
- 2 portions bubble and squeak
- 2 sliced pigs in blankets (optional)

MFTHOD

- 1. Prepare the bubble and squeak. If already made, warm in the oven. Warm turkey slices in a pan with leftover gravy.
- 2. While the turkey/bubble and squeak is warming, place four slices of sourdough on a chopping board and spread cranberry sauce on one side of each slice. This is the inside of your toastie.
- 3. Let's build the filling. Place the stuffing on top of the cranberry sauce on the two slices of sourdough. Add the warmed turkey with some gravy, followed by the bubble and squeak.
- 4. If you love pigs in blankets as much as me, place slices on top of the bubble and squeak. Top with Emmental cheese.
- 5. Top with the remaining sourdough with the cranberry sauce on the inside, then spread mayo on both sides of the outside of the toastie! Trust me, mayo crisps up better than butter on a toastie, but if you doubt me, you can use butter.
- 6. Wipe a frying pan clean with kitchen paper and heat 1 tsp of oil, a knob of butter or beef fat, then wipe with kitchen paper. Fry the sandwiches, weighing them down with a clean pan or a fish slice and fry until golden and crispy (approx 2-3 minutes), then flip over to repeat on the other side. If your pan can only hold one at a time, you can do it in stages, keeping the first one warm in the oven while you make the second.

elcome to Community Council (NBCC) section of this issue of Local Life.

As always, a lot is going on across town. We hope this gives you a snapshot of some of the topics the NBCC

are considering. Please remember everyone is welcome to attend our public meetings, held on the first Tuesday of every month, in the Community Centre at 7.30 pm. You can also participate via Zoom by contacting our secretary, Kathryn Smith (email below), and the minutes will be published on our website. We currently have a vacancy for a community councillor; please contact Kathryn for more information.

We were dismayed to hear that the last remaining bank in town, Bank of Scotland, will close. We are in talks with Cash Access UK, the intended operators of the New Community Banking Hub which is expected to open soon. We understand the Bank of Scotland will only close once the Hub opens, and we are committed to ensuring this remains the case.

Some members of NBCC are part of the group that is arranging the Local Place Plan. Whilst NBCC has not supported any individual project on the Place Plan, we are pleased to report that due process has been followed and that the



the responses to the public consultation. By the time this issue has been published, the final Plan will have been submitted to ELC.

North Berwick Community Development Company (NBCDC) submitted a bid to turn the Abbey Residential Home building into a self-financing community facility. We're unsure of the next steps should NBCDC succeed; however, NBCC supports what the group aims to achieve.

NBCC continue to oppose the plans to introduce controlled parking zones in the town centre and the introduction of camper van parking in specific areas due to potential negative effects on the local economy, tourism, employment, social gatherings and inconvenience to residents. We have requested a meeting with Peter Forsyth from East Lothian Council and await a reply. Whilst ELC is currently trying to answer objections to the proposals, if objectors remain unsatisfied, then the proposals should go to a public hearing. At this stage, we don't have a timeframe for this. but please keep an eye out for updates in our communications.

In addition to keeping on top of key goings on across town, NBCC looks after and funds the 24-hour access defibrillators. The one outside the rugby club recently came to the end of its life, and we would like to say a huge thank you to North Berwick Rugby Club, North Berwick FC and Bass Rock Cricket Club, who clubbed together to support us in paying for a new defibrillator. The Russell Bequest Trust which administers the trust funds of the late Mr James Young Russell to benefit sporting facilities across town, has agreed to fund defibrillator maintenance for the next five years. It's been an incredible display of community spirit to ensure this lifesaving equipment remains accessible to those in need.

We hope you enjoy the festive period and wish you a merry Christmas and send our best wishes for 2025.

Get Crafty With Yarn Café

stablished in August 2023, Yarn Café is a North Berwick-based community group set up following the success of the Fringe By The Sea Community Mega Knitted Bunting project. Headed up by Sandra Nicol, who owns Chandlers on North Berwick High Street, the project involved over 200 people and created over 4,560 individual pieces of sustainable bunting for Fringe by the Sea, which can be re-used each year, and used by other groups, schools and organisations.

Out of this came Yarn Café - a community group working on creative projects. Initially, with only seven members, the group grew steadily and now has over 40 members, and there are twice weekly drop-in sessions in two local venues. The group is open to all, with a range of ages and skill levels, and drop-ins are free. These sessions offer an opportunity to blether, catch up with other group members, and work on various projects, which often includes support with learning something new.

Over the past year, Yarn Café has raised funds and awareness for various local causes. Initially planned as an April's fool joke to get publicity for the Harbour Appeal, the 'alternative harbour wall' – a 14-metre length knitted wall was displayed at the harbour for several weeks over the Easter holidays, raising funds from donations as well as amassing newspaper and social media coverage. The knitted wall panels have since been made into blankets and donated to local charities, including Beach Wheelchairs and the NB Day Centre.

In celebration of the 200th-anniversary of the RNLI, Yarn Café collaborated with North Berwick in Bloom to decorate several of the town's boat planters with knitted Naval flag bunting spelling out North Berwick RNLI. An RNLI 200 banner was made from knitted and crocheted flowers in RNLI colours and displayed opposite the Lifeboat Station throughout summer, and two mannequins decorated with knitted and crocheted flowers, again in RNLI colours, were on duty at the Abbey Church.

For this year's Fringe By The Sea Shared Spaces Community Project, a patchwork panel was created, illustrating all the various Yarn Café projects, using embroidery, knitting, stencilling, crochet, appliqué, patchwork and collage. The group also 'yarn bombed' a vintage bike, nicknamed Daisy, which appeared at Scottish author Jenny Colgan's book launch at Fringe



By The Sea. Daisy was so popular that she appeared in the media and at The Edinburgh International Book Festival, and is now on

display at the Myreton Motor Museum.

Most recently, Yarn Café created an autumn goddessinspired knitted window display in support of the East Lothian Foodbank. Featured in the Evening News, East Lothian Courier and the BBC website, the window was inspired by traditional harvest goddess illustrations. Hundreds of leaves were knitted and crocheted to create a knitted forest scene, complete with pumpkins, acorns, toadstools, blueberries, and a needle-felted hare donated by local Haddington artist Alison Rumbles. Plans for a follow-up winter goddess project for the Foodbank in December are afoot.

Service Before Self

ver two million like-minded people meet regularly in thousands of locations worldwide. The main topic of conversation is the same at all locations. How can we support our local communities and improve the life chances of those most in need? The focus of these groups can be as significant as 'End Polio Now' or as minor as making small loans (Lend with Care) to communities in underdeveloped countries allowing small businesses to flourish.

One such group is the Rotary Club of North Berwick, where energetic, imaginative and experienced members wrestle with the challenges of supporting the local community and contributing to national initiatives or international projects. Many members have held leadership positions in healthcare, finance, commerce, business management, technology or small company ownership. Therefore, the experience that can be applied to these challenges is vast. In the past year, some £40,000 has been raised from a wide variety of fund-raising activities: the well-supported annual charity shop and the well-received Classic Car Tour, both held in the spring, participation in Fringe By The Sea, as well as numerous other Rotary-organised events including, The Cadenza Coral Choir, Bridge Afternoon, Quiz Night, supporting several Muirfield Riding Therapy activities and many others. This club has recently been awarded Silver Status for its regular support of Shelter Boxes (survival equipment), which are sent to areas of disaster where immediate temporary accommodation is required. Next summer, we plan to support our annual charity golf event and the North Berwick Highland Games.

The local community, including food banks, North Berwick Youth Trust, primary schools, healthcare and several local environmental projects, benefit greatly from the funds raised, as do national bodies such as CHAS (Children's Hospices Across Scotland and Poppy Scotland. Internationally, over the years, around £25,000 has been paid out from our Loan with Care initiative, as well as supporting a South African Rotary Club involved with providing meals for 16 local schools and, recently, a seven-year-long



project providing freshwater wells to ten communities in Burkina Faso in North Africa was completed. This project was only possible with the support of 19 other Rotary Clubs. The water supplied is sufficient to provide over 10,000 people and their livestock with drinking water, plus a surplus for irrigation schemes. Children can, therefore, attend school rather than spend several hours a day fetching water from wells several kilometres away.

In early October, a sponsored umbrella walk was organised to support many local clubs, raising essential funding for their activities. The five-mile walk took place from North Berwick to Yellowcraig car park and return. Local clubs and organisations were invited to participate. Sixty-seven walkers took part and were rewarded with a share of funds donated by North Berwick Trust and the resulting Charitable Gift Aid.

Breastfeeding Support

wo local volunteers, Rachel and Julia, who are qualified and badged through the Breastfeeding Network, offer practical breastfeeding support and so much more at a new Breastfeeding Support Group, which runs every second Friday in the Vallis Room at North Berwick Library from 10 am to 11 am.

Volunteers support specific breastfeeding difficulties or provide a listening ear around the highs and lows of breastfeeding. Antenatal visits are welcome, as are discussions about sleep, normal infant behaviour, introducing solids, returning to work, deciding to stop breastfeeding, support with mixed feeding and formula feeding and everything in between. Online resources are shared through a private Facebook group, and some resources can be scanned and accessed at the group.

Many parents find having a young baby isolating. So coming along for a chat and a cuppa is encouraged, and there is a lovely space for babies and older children to enjoy, with hot drinks and biscuits too. The benefits of making connections in our local communities are huge, as is getting along to the local library to see what else is on in the area. orth Berwick Coastal Community Connections (NBCCC) is a charity dedicated to combating Vioneliness and isolation by helping people to connect with the local community. Based in North Berwick and covering the whole coastal area, the charity was set up in 2020 and has gone from strength to strength. It was recently awarded a second threeyear grant from the National Lottery Community Fund. It is run by a small but dedicated staff team of four, some wonderful volunteers, and a board of trustees, all committed to the local community's wellbeing. Nicky Parker, Operations Manager for NBCCC explains, "Our strength as an organisation comes from the passion of all involved to make loneliness in the coastal community something that is talked about and recognised as an issue affecting people from all backgrounds and at any stage of life."

Community Activities to Build Connections

One popular event is the weekly Scone Café, held every Wednesday at the Abbey Church in North Berwick from 2 to 3.30 pm. Whether a regular or a first-time visitor, you are guaranteed a warm welcome and friendly conversation. For those who enjoy light exercise, the Scone Walk offers a chance to stretch your legs with others, leaving the café at 2.15 pm. Each month they hold workshops, and there is a wreath-making workshop on the 11th of December



and a Christmas party on the 18th of December; both events are free to attend and open to everyone. Due to Christmas and New Year's Day falling on Wednesdays, the café will, unfortunately, be closed, but NBCCC is considering alternative arrangements, so stay updated via their social media channels.

Personalised Support Through the Referrals Service

For those seeking more tailored assistance, NBCCC offers a one-to-one referral service. Open to anyone over 18, this service is designed to help individuals build confidence in re-engaging with the community, especially those who may have struggled to get out and about after the COVID-19 pandemic or facing transitions such as retirement. Referrals can be made directly through the charity's website or local GPs. Lynn, the charity's befriending coordinator, is available to discuss individual needs and suggest ways NBCCC can provide support.

Fostering a Compassionate Community

Another vital focus for NBCCC is fostering conversations around death, dying, and grief. Recognising that loss often leads to feelings of isolation, the charity actively promotes open dialogue during national events like 'Absent Friends' and 'Demystifying Death' weeks. They also offer the 'End of Life Skills Aid for Everyone' (EASE) training, which equips participants with the knowledge and confidence to discuss end-of-life issues. Feedback from participants has been overwhelmingly positive, with many finding the course beneficial.
